UNIVERSITY SCHOOL HAD SPLENDID TERM

Report of Headmaster Deals
With Progress of School
During Easter Term—Re-
markable Health Record.

At the conclusion of the Easter term at University School, Mount Tomie, on March 31, the report of the term's progress was read by Mr. J. C. Barnack, the headmaster, in the assembly room of the school.

The health of the school was excellent and never before was there a better term in this respect. An absolutely clean bill of health was shown and not a single boarder was absent through illness.

With regard to the class work and examinations, a number of boys are studying for the R. M. C. examinations in May, and the McGill boys worked hard all through the term for their examination in June. Two boys are sitting for their surveyors preliminary examinations.

In games and other activities the school held a particularly successful term, and the first Rugby fifteen carried off the City Intermediate Championship and also the championship of the Province. The senior team did exceptionally well in the Canadian Rifle League miniature series. In the three matches already shot they had attained an average of 96, which should bring them very near the top. It was reported that very good work had been done by the cadet corps, but that its activities were handicapped by the requisition of all the rifles. It was hoped that the corps would be able to keep the cup already held, which is emblematic of the championship of the Province.

A school magazine was published, and one Saturday night concert was held. During the term services were held by the Rev. E. M. Willis, who also held confirmation classes.

On the occasion of the reading of the report, the Rev. W. W. Bolton spoke very kindly of Mr. R. V. Harvey, who is at the front with the Seventh Battalion. He asked the boys to think often of him and the "old boys," who are also fighting. He reminded the boys of the keen interest which Mr. Harvey took in their doings and, though at the front, was overjoyed to read of successes of the school.

After cheers had been accorded the masters the proceedings concluded.
